AUSTRALIA		
	Austins Ferry - Granton Precinct	A group of 4 volunteers cleaned up along the edge of Roseneath Rivulet, an area where locals and others dump rubbish and where wind blown material accumulates. Several bags of waste were collected however volunteers were unable to access heavy waste. The organisers have asked the local council to attend to the heavier waste and to help educate locals not to dump waste in the future.
	Brambles Industries limited	Brambles, CHEP and Recall employees, their families and friends cleaned up a section of Lane Cove National Park located in Sydney on September 17. The Clean Up followed the Lane Cove River through the Mangrove Boardwalk and National Park Bushland. The spot was nominated by National Park rangers as an area that would significantly benefit from a Clean up. Participants celebrated their efforts during a barbeque held in the park after the Clean Up.
	Clean Up Railway	On September 17, Clean Up Railway cleaned between Canterbury and Camberwell Railway Stations. In total 40 bags of waste were collected which council later removed. The most common waste found included spray cans, bottles, cans, plastic drink bottles and paint tins.
	Cook Islands Queensland Association Inc.	Members of the Cook Islands Queensland Community joined with CHEP employee Teura Moeara and the Cook Islands Queensland Association to Clean Up the river banks along the Logan River in Eagleby, Brisbane on two occasions in 2006. Their activities were held in celebration of Earth Day, April 22 and CUW Weekend September 16. For the CUW Weekend, 53 volunteers gathered at 11am to commence cleaning. They cleaned the boat ramp along the Logan River at Eagleby removing cans, bottles, papers and syringes. The group then proceeded to clean 1km of the Riverhills Rd. The Clean Up finished in a park at the end of the road. All volunteers then celebrated their efforts at a barbeque.
	Dive 2000	On September 17, 9 divers and 4 non divers cleaned up Balmoral Baths and the surrounding beach area. Common findings included fishing knives, fishing line, mobile phones, batteries, paper, plastic bags and plastic food utensils. From the beach 6kgs of waste was collected while 26kgs were removed from the water. Mosman Council were very pleased with the group's efforts and included an article about the event on their website.
	Fairlight Precinct Community Forum	On September 17, Fairlight Precinct Community Forum and 10 volunteers cleaned the local beach, foreshore and streets. They collected 100 completed questionnaires concerning the local environment and desired future action.
	Friends Of Blind Creek Billabong, Knox	Friends of Blind Creek Billabong worked at least 15 times this year planting and weeding in a bushland area in the Shire of Knox in Melbourne. This area has over 100 indigenous species however these are threatened by nearby development. The group held 2 clean ups in this area. One was to celebrate Clean Up Australia Day and the other was held during the CUW Weekend. The plastic and glass collected was recycled. A group of 20 volunteers assisted with the clean ups. The group tries to keep the creek clean for wild life and this means they need to remove the waste that is dumped. The group's efforts were featured in local newspapers and magazines. Local support provided by: Knox Council and Knox Environment Society.
	Friends of the Children Foundation	Friends of the Children Foundation cleaned up along Scotchman Creek and Melbourne Water Retarding Basin in the Mount Waverly Area on September 17. The job proved difficult as accessing the waste items on the banks was almost impossible due to the muddy nature of the banks. A group of 9 volunteers collected 14 bags of waste.
	Gecko's Adventures	Gecko's Adventures held 2 clean up trips over CUW Weekend. One trip took place on the banks of the Nile in Egypt, the other in Eastern Africa. In addition 3 tours through Egypt and Jordan had their itineraries altered so that participants could clean up campsites on the banks of the River Nile. A specified section of the Nile Riverbank between Luxor and Aswan was cleaned up by 19 participants. A lot of litter was found along the banks of the Nile which detracts from the natural beauty of the area. Gecko's Clean Up East Africa Safari took place in the Tanzanian town of Engaruka. Working closely with the local schoolteachers, 16 participants helped re-paint and clean up a local school. Gecko's took supplies of paint, brushes, Poly filla and sandpaper to help repair the school that was fairly run-down.
	North Rocks Community Church	On September 16, 3 volunteers worked to maintain the flora and fauna of Lake Parramatta by removing weeds and invasive plants that threaten native flora and fauna. These included Cassia and Small Leafed Privit seedlings, Asparagus Fern, Lantana and Blackberry bushes. Invasive roots were uprooted and parent trees poisoned. A total of 10 bags of unwanted plants were collected as well as bundles of tree branches. Parramata City Council collected the bags and branches.

	Green Power	<p>As part of long term efforts to reduce the amount of waste produced at the Chinese Mid-Autumn Festival a clean up activity and festival survey were held once again in October 2006. Following festival activities in Aberdeen Country Park on October 7 over 100 volunteers including the Permanent Secretary for the Environment, Transport and Works collected waste that had been left behind. A survey entitled "Consumption and Celebration Habits during Mid-Autumn Festival" was then carried out with the results published in newspapers and shown on radio and television. Over the years the clean ups and surveys have seen a continual decrease in festival waste as more and more people re-use festival lanterns and choose food with more environmentally friendly packaging.</p> <p>Local support provided by: Hong Kong Electric Holdings Ltd (HKE).</p>

	Association For Promotion Of Educational And Socio-Cultural Activities (APESCA)	<p>A range of activities were held including clean ups, quizzes, debates and drawing competitions. Clean ups took place in market areas, at bus and train stations, and schools. Scout groups joined with volunteers from APESCA to lend a hand.</p>
	Australian High Commission, India	<p>A number of schools in Delhi held celebrations on CUW Weekend as part of their year round environmental programs. The New Era Public School made a number of trips to nearby villages to educate the communities on the importance of keeping roads and drains free of waste to help reduce the incidence of mosquitoes and water borne diseases. A number of the schools have appointed "cleanliness marshals" to reduce littering and implemented recycling programs as a result of their involvement in CUW Weekend.</p>
	Center for Environmental Studies	<p>A group of college students and a few faculty members spent a day in the first week of September, testing water samples from Vaigai River in Madurai. On September 18 volunteers also collected the small amounts of waste that could be found in their school grounds.</p>
	Friendship Foundation	<p>The Foundation carried out a number of clean up exercises during the year including several along the banks of the Bellal Cheruvu Lake, a 1 day event to remove waste from the grounds of a college in Bodhan, and a series of clean ups to remove waste from water bodies in Vikarabad reserve forest. For WED a 4 day event was held in collaboration with Greenpeace Youth Programme and the local chapter of Solar Generation. The event included petition signing, clean ups and awareness raising initiatives. Tree planting was carried out on a monthly basis throughout the year on the Foundation's organic farm located just outside Hyderabad. The farm is also being developed as an environmental education centre.</p>
	Gram Vikas	<p>In a follow up visit from last year, 150 students and 14 teachers from Konkia took part in a clean up campaign in Tamana and Medinipur villages, and Tamana Chhak market place on September 12 and 13. The students collected waste from residential areas, roadways and drains, and planted seedlings along roads and cleared areas. Many of the local residents appreciated the efforts of the students and joined in with their activities. A play was also performed in Medinipur where the village leader promised to implement more environmentally friendly practices in the future. The shop keepers at Tamana Chhaka market place expressed similar sentiments promising to manage their waste better following the students' visit.</p>
	Maitri	<p>An awareness program was held at Bima Kunj Parisar Kolar Road, Bhopal on June 5 with students and residents of Bima Kunj in attendance. The program included an environmental painting competition for children, tree planting, a water quiz and a lecture on urban water conservation. Maitri also developed a project to identify suitable waste disposal sites in Sagar District Madhya Pradesh using Geographical Information Systems (GIS).</p>
	Muthamil Education and Rural Development Society (MERDS)	<p>During September MERDS visited 5 villages to remove waste from ponds used for drinking water. The ponds were also deepened and banks stabilized to provide a more secure water supply for the future. More than 20 volunteers in each village took part.</p> <p>Local support provided by: Self Help Group Federation, Panchayat Institution.</p>
	National Forum for Environmental Studies and Conservation - (NESCO)	<p>In collaboration with Ewing Christian College a clean up and environmental rally was held in September. Students from the college collected waste from the college campus before taking to the streets to raise environmental awareness among the wider community. A lecture took place describing the environmental issues of Allahabad, and students taking environmental studies were also required to write a report as part of their assessment.</p>

In September members of the community in Surabaya received training on composting and how to lead a sustainable lifestyle.</p> <p>Local support provided by: Brawijaya University, Surabaya Municipal City Government, The Association of Farmers Indonesia.</p>
	Canggu Communitiy School	<p>A beach clean up was held in 3 locations in the Kuta Utara area with students, teachers and parents all taking part. The volunteers managed to collect large amounts of polystyrene pieces which were scattered amongst vegetation. With the assistance of Eco-Bali the collected waste was separated for recycling. Canggu Community School worked with another local school and hopes to engage them in more environmental activities in the future.</p>
	EGA Briefings	<p>A clean up campaign held during September included clean ups in 15 cities across Indonesia with nearly 24,000 volunteers taking part to collect 40 tonnes of waste. An exhibition was held on September 4-10 in Jakarta with 2,500 people visiting the stall in Orchid Garden Mall. On CUW Weekend more than 200 volunteers planted 10,000 trees in Bekasi Regional District including the Karang Bahagia area, schools and residential areas. On September 16 Clean Up Bandung was held in cooperation with SMA 2 Bandung high school with 400 volunteers helping to collect waste from the school grounds, surrounding streets and Kali Cikapundung River. On September 17 more than 1,500 volunteers took part in a clean up in central Jakarta which was attended by the Minister of Environment and attracted widespread media coverage.</p>
	Sunrise School	<p>On September 16 a beach clean up was held at Legian Beach with volunteers from Sunrise School and the Clean Seminyak Group (a group of community conscious businesses) taking part. Waste was removed from the beach and the nearby sand dunes and estuary and sorted for recycling before being collected by government provided trucks. The next day students from the Sunrise School and Jodie O'Shea Children's Home performed a play entitled "Is it really rubbish?" A recycled craft stall and paper making workshops were also held with over 200 people in attendance. Sites were located mainly along waterways including rivers, lakes and beaches. The types and quantities of waste were recorded with plastic being the most common item found. JEAN have also been working on a collaborative marine debris project with organisations in South Korea. Children were also given the opportunity to learn about the wildlife living in the local rivers.</p>

	The Boat Landing Guest House	<p>A range of measures were taken in an effort to reduce the amount of waste produced and left behind after traditional boat races held in the villages of Ban Khone, Ban Luang, Ban Vieng Tai, Ban Vieng Neua and Ban Don Khoun. Waste bins were provided throughout the event by the provincial tourism office. During the festival staff from the guest house handed out flyers asking festival stall holders to place waste in the bins and to encourage their customers to do the same, and to clean up their stall area after the festival. The flyers also encouraged festival goers to use natural materials rather than styrofoam to make the candle boats that are launched into the river at the end of the festival. The stall holders and entertainers did more to clean up after themselves than ever before and the waste bins were well utilised. The day after the festival students, residents and village leaders helped to clean up any waste that was still left behind.</p>

	Global Environment Centre	<p>Clean up events were held in 4 different areas in September with more than 500 volunteers taking part. On September 14 a total of 16 primary and secondary schools cleaned up at Sungai Telok Nyiro during a river education camp. On September 17 clean up and tree planting activities were held at Taman Aman including Sungai Pecala. Water testing took place at the lake and algae and weeds were also removed. Clean up activities were also held at the park and lake at Taman Bandaran, Kelana Jaya. At Tanah Rata in the Cameron Highlands 120 volunteers took part in a clean up of the town centre collecting over a tonne of recyclable waste.</p> <p>Local support provided by: Majlis Bandaraya Petaling Jaya, Alam Flora, REACH.</p>
	Malaysian Nature Society	<p>In September 50 volunteers from Hafiz Secondary School cleaned up the school grounds and surrounding area. Removal of waste has helped reduce mosquito habitat and the risk of diseases such as dengue fever. The collected waste was separated with unused clothing, plastics, paper, glass and metals being sent for recycling. The funds raised from recycling have helped offset the waste management costs. A number of trees and flowers were also planted on the school grounds to help improve the vegetation in the area.</p>
	Veolia Water (Dungun) SDN BHD	<p>On September 16, clean up and waste education activities were held in Kampung Serdang village in Dungun, Terengganu with an estimated 300 volunteers including school students, residents, Veolia Water staff and local leaders taking part. A prize was awarded to the cleanest household on the day. As part of the program 40 students were selected and trained as environmental ambassadors. Radio broadcasts took place on local radio over 3 days to raise awareness about the campaign and the need for a cleaner environment in general. The campaign has evoked interest among community members who are now interested in holding similar initiatives.

NEW CALEDONIA*

Association pour la Sauvegarde de la Nature Neo-Caledonienne

A total of 5,358 participants and 30 organisations were involved in clean ups throughout New Caledonia from August 28 and October 31. The largest event, a large-scale recycling day took place on October 1. The 2 points of collection were located at Montravel where 192 bags of 100L bottles and 223 bags of aluminium were collected and at Rivière Salée where 92 bags of bottles and 86 bags of aluminium were gathered. Other clean ups that occurred in New Caledonia were held at Lifou, Maré, Houaïlou, Ponérihouen, Poindimié, Pouébo, Népoui, La Foa, Tontouta, Païta and Mont-Dore. Local residents of the Rivière Salée cleaned the local mangroves for the first time.

Mocamana, L'Esprit Nature

A can collection campaign was organised with the help of real estate company SIC. From September 11-24 the members of Mocamana managed to collect 2.1 tonnes of cans which they later sold for recycling. This money will be used to plant trees in every city. A second project which was adopted by the Australian Consulate involved workshops held at the CHS Albert Bousquet where locals made 50 waste baskets with natural fibres. The baskets will be placed in schools and public areas in the district of Mount Gilds. The district will be responsible for the waste collection. The profits obtained from the recycled material will go towards Mocamana's tree planting project. On November 8 several schools participated in an environmental education activity where they purchased waste baskets and collected cans.

NEW ZEALAND

2Ways Company Limited

2Ways Company Limited together with 20 volunteers, aged from 22 to 70 cleaned up the Avon Riverbank between the bridges of Remembrance and Armagh Streets. Volunteers were international students and migrants from China, the Netherlands, France, Japan, Taiwan, Spain and Kurdistan, and 1 local volunteer. A total of 20kgs of waste was collected including mainly cigarette butts, plastic bags and packaging. The event was covered by local media. Locals and tourists who passed by were very pleased to see the clean up activity and expressed interest in joining future clean ups.

Christchurch City Council

The Christchurch City Council coordinated clean up events carried out by 3,797 registered volunteers. Some of the volunteers focussed on the city's parks, streets and reserves while others focussed on sections of wetlands, rivers, estuaries and beaches. Council support came in the form of compiling and distributing recycled-paper packs including health and safety guidelines; rubbish bags; gloves; free refuse station passes; participation certificates and the publication of "Thank You" ads. Teams of council staff also joined the clean up at Summit Road. City Care provided valuable assistance by picking up the full rubbish bags. Volunteers came from businesses, schools, Rotary and Lions clubs, community groups, 4WD and other recreational groups, families, and individuals. They managed to collect a total of 4.27 tonnes of waste. The clean ups created a cleaner environment, increased litter awareness, brought communities together and generated a lot of positive support from the general public owing to the visibility of the clean ups. Environmental reserves such as Travis Swamp and South Shore Spit, which are important bird breeding and feeding grounds, benefited from removal of items capable of choking birds and other animals. In addition, soil and water benefited from the reduction in leachate pollutants such as cigarette butts.

In the lead up to CUW Weekend information and promotional materials were distributed to government departments, NGOs, schools and the local community. On September 15-17 over 700 volunteers from a range of groups took part in a clean up at sites around Lahore. Environmental lectures were also held at 9 schools with a special focus on minimising plastic bag use. Tree planting took place in school grounds and a schools painting competition was held.

Envirotech

In 2006 Envirotech have been planning for a study that will look at solid waste management in 10 cities of Pakistan. The study will be completed over a 9 month period and will be used to improve solid waste management with a particular focus on establishing waste to energy plants to reduce waste and provide alternative forms of energy.

Human Resource Development Society (HRDS)

Approximately 13,000 female primary school students received training under an environmental training program organised by HRDS in cooperation with local government institutions. HRDS have seen a positive change in the community with regards to waste management and related health issues as a result of the training program. They are also working with the government and other NGOs to bring about further behavioural and institutional change.
