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ALGERIA

Scouts Musulmans Algeriens (Groupe Ettawassol)

For WED in June 100 scouts, students and residents took part in the "I like My District" campaign removing 200 bags of waste from Remchi city. For CUW Weekend in September 70 scouts and other volunteers took part in the inaugural Clean Up the Mediterranean initiative. Over 2 days volunteers removed more than 200 bags of waste and marine debris from Honaine beach. Local support provided by: Green Club.

BOTSWANA

Department of Waste Management and Pollution Control

During July, all 10 districts of Botswana participated in clean up campaigns with 36,000 volunteers taking part including residents, businesses, NGOs, students and community leaders. Over 100 tonnes of waste is believed to have been collected. The cleanest village was judged at the end of August based on litter and waste management facilities. A ceremony to award prizes to the winners was held over CUW Weekend along with an additional clean up campaign in the tourist area of Maun in the North West District. Other activities held over the Weekend included plays, poem recitals, traditional music and a recycled waste exhibition that awarded prizes for the best items made from plastic, paper, rubber, metal and other types of waste. A song writing competition was also held under the theme "Our Environment, Our Future: Let Us Care For It", and an environmental art competition was run for secondary school students. The activities were well supported by government departments, the private sector and members of the community.

BURKINA FASO

On September 16 more than 1,000 volunteers from 40 organisations took part in clean up activities in various sectors of Boboo-Dioulasso City. More than 50 cubic metres of waste was collected from the streets and waterways. The activities took place with the support of local authorities.

In March and April a training program was held with interested volunteers learning how to recycle plastic and paper to make shoe polish, antirust and chipboard which can be sold to provide an income. Over CUW Weekend lectures were held on waste management, environmental conservation and HIV/AIDS. Clean up activities were held at Bambili market, the town centre and one of the colleges with local businesses taking part in a cleanliness competition. The awareness campaign involved 300 volunteers with a target audience of approximately 15,000 people. Composting and plastic recycling programs have also been piloted during the year.

An awareness and tree planting campaign also took place in which 1,800 students from 15 schools and 2 universities took part. CRESANU has also organised the treatment of drinking water drawn from the rivers of Uvira Territory, a sustainable fishing project, a weeding campaign on Lake Tanganika, a compost project in Ruzizi and a 1,500 hectare reforestation project in Luhwinja.

	Australian High Commission - Accra, Ghana	CUW Weekend activities were held in La, Atorkor and Kokrobitey on September 16 in collaboration with CUW Members Infant Malaria Prevention Foundation, Bomingo Community Organisation, Atorkor Youth Association, Atorkor Local Area Basic School, Atorkor Development Foundation and RSG Global. Approximately 2,000 volunteers took part including sponsors, students, teachers and members of the community. Mosquito spraying equipment was supplied as part of the High Commission's Direct Aid Program. The equipment will be used in the areas covered by the clean up activities. The campaign's key messages were related to malaria prevention, ongoing environmental protection, and the importance of a clean environment to the tourist industry. It is hoped the campaign will act as a catalyst for more ongoing initiatives. 	Gbawe Youth Club	After finding out an area of degraded forest had been reserved by the traditional chief members of the club approached the chief to propose a series of conservation measures. The forest was suffering from vegetation and biodiversity loss. Deforestation had also been causing health problems in the area with increased amounts of dust resulting in increased eye infections, respiratory illnesses, allergies and mental stress. A tree planting event was therefore held on August 26 with the aim to begin restoring the forest. More than 70 volunteers helped plant 200 mahogany seedlings. The event created great interest and enthusiasm for the forest in the local community.
	Rescue Mission Ghana	On CUW Weekend volunteers gathered at Pantang Hospital to help remove waste and weeds from the hospital grounds. Some cleaning of the indoor areas was also carried out to help improve the conditions for the patients. Close to 300 people took part in the exercise which served to remind all participants about the importance of a clean environment for human health.
	RSG Global Pty Ltd	On September 16, RSG Global employees along with staff from the Lincoln International School, and La Beach Hotel took part in a clean up exercise organised by the Australian High Commission in and around La township including La beach. Around 80 volunteers managed to clear large amounts of mostly plastic waste from the area. The WED activities included a series of lectures, workshops and exhibitions with a focus on desertification.

Christian Women Partners

In June an educational campaign was held amongst the fishing community of Mageta Island. Organisers made door to door visits to talk to residents about the negative environmental impacts of waste found on the beaches and the importance of waste management for human health. Over 100 local residents also took part in a clean up and tree planting exercise on Kabarua beach. In September another clean up campaign was held on the island. In addition to collecting waste 1,000 indigenous and fruit seedlings were provided by the government and planted across 7 beaches. Environmental clubs within schools and for certain beach areas were also formed during the year.

Former Mates Adventure and Discovery Association (FORMADA)

Clean up activities were held in a number of rural areas in March and in several estates in Nairobi in September. Over 200 volunteers took part in the activities in September which included collecting waste, tree planting and an educational campaign that reached 500 students in 5 schools. The campaign dealt with all types of waste with a particular focus on reducing plastic bag use. The organisers would like to thank Alessandra from Italy and Ronald Karanja, the principal of Friends High School for their assistance.

Humanity for Orphans, Youth and Widows Initiatives Kenya (HOYWIK)

A 2 day workshop held to raise awareness about the Environmental Management Act was attended by 50 community members and stakeholders from Kibera settlement. A tree was planted at the end of the second day to commemorate the occasion. Following the workshop the community has improved their waste management practices and a number of youth groups have also been formed to help collect waste.

		Clean up exercises took place in June and September with the June clean up including the planting of 2,000 trees for Egerton University conservation week. This event attracted close to 700 volunteers including staff, students and members of surrounding communities. The September activities included a 2 hour public awareness campaign followed by the collection of waste. More than 280 volunteers helped to collect 2 tonnes of mainly plastic waste from in and along the river which flows through Egerton University grounds. The campaign has helped participants see the importance of disposing of their waste in an environmentally responsible manner.

		On CUW Weekend, volunteers along with staff from the Metropolitan Hospital gathered in a housing estate of Nairobi to discuss the best approach to minimise waste and in particular plastic bag use. Waste was collected with paper and organic waste being separated for recycling, and bins were placed around the estate for future use. 		Clean up activities were held in Gachororo township in February and in Ruiru in October. Waste was collected and bins were installed to help improve ongoing waste management.

		Over CUW Weekend, 20 volunteers helped collect 6 tonnes of waste from Mbita with the assistance of the town council. The collected waste was transported to Nairobi for recycling. Subsequent clean ups have taken place following this event. Local support provided by: Mbita Town Council

		In March, a clean up and tree planting program was held over two days in Naivasha Town. Students from 11 schools planted over 400 trees in their school grounds and will continue to take care of the plants as they grow. Approximately 400 students took part in the clean up campaign which found plastic waste to be the most widespread waste issue. Permanent public waste bins were also installed as part of the campaign, and it is hoped that Naivasha will serve as a model for other towns. 		On January 21 volunteers took part in clean up activities at the Giraffe Educational Centre outside Nairobi and on February 4 in the Parklands area of Nairobi. On June 2 WED celebrations were held at the Giraffe Centre where songs and a poem on desertification were recited, an indigenous tree was planted and prizes for the Centre's annual art and essay competition were presented. On June 4 approximately 100 children took part in a clean up in a Nairobi neighbourhood. The Club collects plastic waste for recycling year round and uses the money raised to run tree planting initiatives. Their major tree planting project in 2006 took place at Aberdare Forest where 5,000 trees were planted in November.

		In September a clean up event was held in Bungoma with men and women taking part to help raise awareness about the need for improved hygiene in the area. As a result of a cleaner environment and more thorough cleaning of water receptacles disease rates in the area have been reduced, and ongoing promotion of hygienic practices is now occurring. Residents have also now expressed interest in planting native trees to control soil erosion on the banks of Khalaba, and women's groups have begun planting indigenous vegetables to improve biodiversity values and provide an income. Association Libre Pour la Promotion de l'Habitat et du Logement (ALPHALOG)

In June information on waste management and desertification was broadcast on radio stations in Ségou, Sebougou and Pelengana. A clean up campaign was also held with large amounts of waste collected by volunteers from government departments, businesses and the general community. In September CUW Weekend was marked by continuing work on the construction of 20 ecologically friendly toilets in Sebougou. A clean up exercise was also held to remove waste from the public market place. In addition educational talks were held to raise awareness about the importance of waste management and the use of organic waste for compost. An estimated 300 people were in attendance.

Comité de Gestion et de Valorisation des Déchets COGEVAD C VI

Clean up activities were held in 10 neighbourhoods in Lome on a monthly basis from March to December. Between 150 and 350 people participated each month. The activities included the removal of waste, clearing gutters, planting trees and insect control. Radio broadcasts also took place to help raise awareness about the activities as well as organic farming methods. Meetings to discuss similar issues were held in a number of schools, attracting a great deal of interest from the local youth. Environmental training for teachers was held in November and December, and gatherings were also held in 4 local neighbourhoods to help raise awareness about the environment and related health issues. In addition a workshop was held for waste collection businesses to help improve their capacity to provide domestic waste services.

Blue Print Concepts

A clean up exercise was organized around Danfodio Road in Aba City with 41 volunteers from the local community taking part. The exercise took place with the support of the environmental health department who provided waste removal equipment on the day.

Global Youth Positive Empowerment Initiators (GYPEI)

Activities were held in 3 local government areas with 900 students from three schools taking part in waste removal and environmental education initiatives. In total 2 trucks were filled with the collected waste. The activities have resulted in a cleaner environment and increased awareness among participants and the wider community of the need for a healthy environment. A range of activities aimed at addressing drainage, erosion and waste management issues were held on a monthly basis in the Oke-Ijebu area of Akure. <p>The Australian High Commissioner and the Minister for Environment and Natural Resources attended the Seychelles annual clean up campaign which took place on September 15 with the theme "Committed towards a cleaner Seychelles - Have you bin doing your bit?". The campaign focused on controlling mosquitoes and the Chikungunya virus by removing rubbish and ensuring it was disposed of correctly. The events were well covered by media including a radio quiz on AM and FM radio stations. As in previous years car registration stickers for the month of September featured clean up messages that will serve to remind drivers of their responsibility to keep the environment waste free. Nearly 2,000 volunteers participated including school students, police, defence force staff and private businesses.</p>

In addition environmental education campaigns and schools tours, tree planting and flora and fauna protection activities were held. The activities were implemented with the assistance of local coordinators based in each of the 16 districts of Mogadishu. Students from F-Pens, SAFE, Al-bilad Primary and Secondary School, Hamar Boarding School and Howlwadag Primary School were also active participants in these activities.</p>

<p>The school planted mangroves and terrestrial plants throughout the year and also held celebrations for CUW Weekend in September. Celebrations included collecting waste from the local area and the planting of 700 trees. The waste collection not only helped improve the state of the environment, it also helped reduce the conditions that contribute to the incidence of cholera. The activities have helped the community recognise the actions they can take themselves to help improve their environment and health.</p>

<p>After identifying the loss of mangroves as an issue requiring attention the Society approached local authorities who agreed to work with them on a planting program. Planting took place in January and February and again in June and July. Follow up planting is planned to take place at 6 month intervals. A ban on removing mature mangroves for timber has now been implemented and has been well received and adhered to.</p>

Public waste bins were also placed along the roads and emptied regularly by volunteers. The public presence of the volunteers and bins has helped to increase awareness in the local community about their responsibility to take care of the environment.</p>
